River Stewardship

With their first trip down the Grand River in 1988, the Ancient Mariners began a practice they continue to this day - caring for the natural environment they hold so dear.



Alarmed at the amount of erosion, dumping, tree cutting and pollution they observed in their weekly canoe trips, they reported their observations to the GRCA Executive Committee in July 1989. Wide media coverage and quick action by Regional Council resulted in a shift in attitude and a greater sense of public pride in this wonderful natural resource.

The Mariners have received many awards for their efforts on behalf of the environment over the years.

In 2003 the AMCC spearheaded a restoration project at the Glen Morris access point on the Grand River. Partnering with the GRCA and Brant County, they accessed the necessary funds and donated their labour to create the Eric Thomlinson River Access.

Future projects will enhance access points, making paddling the Grand and other rivers in the watershed more pleasurable for all.

Pollination in Our World

Of our crop species, 70% require pollination. Thus pollinators are responsible for 30 per cent of the food we eat. While bees perform most of this work, butterflies, beetles and flies also contribute towards pollination.

Native wild bees (20,000 species worldwide, 800 in Canada) are responsible for an increasing proportion of agricultural pollination and most pollination of wild plants.

There have been dramatic declines in wild bee populations in recent years, bringing attention to the critical role they play in feeding the world.

One of the natural resources that bees and other pollinating insects need is a steady and diverse supply of flowers in bloom which provide nectar and pollen. An environment with a variety of flowers ensures a healthy assortment of wild bees and other pollinators.

The aim of the Cambridge Pollinator Preserve is to provide this required forage along with chemical-free habitats for wild bees and other pollinating insects. This concept will assure a supply of valuable insects to surrounding gardens and backyards when they are needed. It also gives those bee populations that are threatened a chance to grow to numbers that have a better chance of survival.

Cambridge Pollinator Preserve

The Ancient Mariners Canoe Club members are committed to leaving a greener world for our grandchildren and their children. As well, the AMCC membership has long sought an appropriate means of creating a legacy in recognition of its past members.

In the fall of 2009, the Board of Directors and the full membership endorsed the following statement:

“The most enduring legacy of the AMCC to the community will be voluntary environmental initiatives that give something back in appreciation for the recreational benefits provided by the Grand River.”

The Cambridge Pollinator Preserve will function as a preserve for wild, native, insect pollinators while raising public awareness about the importance of insect pollinators to the ecology and food chain.



The Ancient Mariners are committed to maintaining and promoting the preserve and using it as an educational opportunity for students and the general public.
